

L. P. ANDERSON AGED PIONEER, DIES THURSDAY

Funeral services were held Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the Methodist church for L. P. Anderson, who died at his home here May 18, 1944. Rev. M. M. Moss officiated. Burial was made in Oak Park cemetery, with Gayman-Sutton-Downing funeral home in charge of arrangements.

Lucius Perry Anderson, son of James Harvey Anderson and Rachel Huff Anderson, was born in Pinkeyville, Ill., May 28, 1874, and died May 18, 1944, at his home in Chandler. In 1882 he moved with his parents to Nevada, Mo., and later to Winfield, Kan. He attended public school in these towns.

On September 22, 1891, he moved to Chandler. He was married to Mary S. Gardner here Feb. 13, 1898, and they established a home here. To this union five children were born.

A pioneer resident of Chandler, Mr. Anderson sold the first Ford cars here. He owned and operated the Ford agency with his brother-in-law, Clyde Crane, from 1914 to 1918. Following the dissolving of this partnership, he continued in the automobile business with the Dodge agency until 1939. At this time he acquired the management of the Greyhound and Turner bus depot, and was in charge of this business until his death.
